- In the wider community - the accommodation and training facility of the YMCA in Malton, The Ryedale Detached Youth Work Project and the transformation of Pickering Magistrates Court into a youth provision.

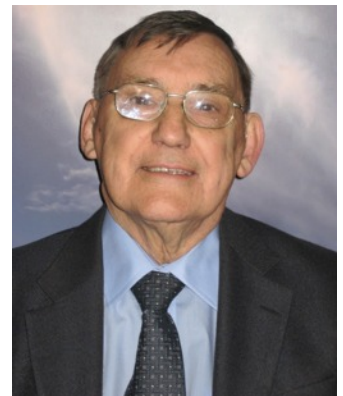
As a County Councillor Betsy led the Council, on Education matters. Working with the Director of Education, helping to guide schools through the minefield of government legislation, initiatives and funding.

Betsy was a staunch advocate for Lady Lumley's School and for the Youth of Ryedale both at a local and County Council level, sometimes in the background but always a formidable force. She had particular concern for disadvantaged, vulnerable and 'wayward' young people, recognising that they had endless potential if given the right opportunities, support and guidance.

Governor News

The Government has published rules on how schools' governing bodies should be organised and all schools will have to reconstitute their governing bodies in the new academic year. The Lady Lumley's governors are ahead of the game on these changes. As part of the move to a new structure, we had a Full Governors meeting at the school on Tuesday night as opposed to a sub-committee meeting. Governors have decided to move away from the traditional full governor and sub-committee meetings structure and instead have more full governing body meetings. Whilst this involves individual governors in more meetings, it is hoped that there would be an even better flow of information and less need to repeat items already discussed. Each meeting will have an identified theme and on Tuesday this was student progress. Governors discussed particular groups of students involved in the Year 7 catch-up programme and those with special educational needs. Governors also heard back from colleagues who had attended the consultation meeting in Scarborough about the proposed University Technical College to be built in the town. The meeting concluded with a review of the school's most recent examination data as displayed in the RAISE online document. Stuart Cleary led governors through the complexities of this very detailed and comprehensive document. After 65 pages of tables and graphs, the statistics clearly paint a very positive picture of the school's performance.

Leeds Theatre Trip

On Thursday 5th February a group of year 11 drama students and sixth formers saw 'Broke' at Leeds West Yorkshire Playhouse. Devised by Paper Birds, the play explored the topic of poverty using the words of real people from throughout the UK.

It was an amazing experience which made us reflect upon how people on the front line of poverty and debt struggle through everyday situations. It was a thoroughly enjoyable yet touching piece of theatre. Thanks to the drama department for organising this lovely trip.

British Athletics Cross Challenge at Milton Keynes

Two Lady Lumley's School students continued their most impressive run of results at championship races, when they competed in the third and penultimate race of the British Athletics Cross Challenge series at Milton Keynes. **Bronwen Owen** and **Emma Clapton** have achieved medal winning performances at all four of their cross country championship races this year, at county, area and national level.

The Thornton le Dale based duo, who are members of Scarborough Athletic Club, both improved their overall standing in the Cross Challenge series. Bronwen was the runner up in the Women's Under 20 and Emma was the third in the Women's Under 17 event. These splendid results auger well for the national championships in two weeks time. Bronwen will be competing in the Welsh Championships for the first time, after a previous win at the English National, and Emma will run in the English Championships at Hampstead Heath London.
