Lessons from Auschwitz Project

During June Mrs Thompson and I have taken part in the 'Lessons from Auschwitz' course run for teachers by the Holocaust Educational trust. This was an intensive three day course which involved a conference in Manchester where we had the chance to listen to the testimony of Rudi Oppenheimer, a holocaust survivor, then a day long visit to Auschwitz and a follow up seminar where we reviewed what we had learnt from the visit. For Mrs Thompson and myself, this was a completely life changing experience which will have a significant impact on how we teach the Holocaust.

Meeting Rudi Oppenheimer was truly humbling. His talk, which focused on his experiences as a Jewish child in transit and concentration camps, gave a first-hand account of the way in which the lives of Jews in Europe were made steadily worse under the Nazis. Sadly Rudi's parents died in Bergen-Belsen but he and his brother and sister were lucky enough to survive and make a new life for themselves in England. We were struck by how engaging Rudi was a speaker and also how at the age of 83 he bears no anger or bitterness about the way he was treated by the Nazis. He really was an extraordinary man and it was a privilege to hear him speak.

The trip to Auschwitz was also invaluable as it gave us a chance to really see first-hand the way in which the camps were organised and the terrible conditions prisoners were kept in. There are many images from the camps that will stay with us both. Having reflected on the experience we are keen to think carefully about how we teach the Holocaust in the future. We now appreciate the importance in trying to help students understand the individual stories of Jews both before and after the Holocaust, as it is only by re-humanising the figure of 6 million Jews killed, that we can begin to understand how terrible this mass genocide was. Governor News

Governors met on Tuesday this week with a focus on Teaching and Learning. Governors looked at an example Education Health Care Plan (EHCP). The EHCP is the new documentation that schools complete with other agencies for students with particularly complex needs. Governors recognised how this is one factor in how well the school supports all the students at Lady Lumley's. Governors also looked at the projected examination results for the current and future Years 11 and 13, student attendance and the lengthy list of educational visits proposed for 2015-16. As well as ratifying some updated school policies, Governors also heard about the new Ofsted Inspection Framework and feedback from training on the Government's Prevent programme.

Outdoor Education in July

The next few weeks see an action packed timetable of outdoor learning activities for our students.

Year 11 Duke of Edinburgh's Silver canoe expedition : Our Silver students are completing a three day canoeing expedition on the River Derwent. Students will be wild camping by the side of the river and will be totally self-sufficient for the expedition, carrying all their own food and equipment. Completion of this expedition will allow these students to gain the Silver Award and look to complete Gold once they join us next year in the Sixth Form. Students please meet at 0900 at school on Monday 29th June ready for assessment.

Year 10 Duke of Edinburgh's Bronze training and assessment expedition : We believe we offer a truly unique expedition package for our Bronze students. After two days of high-quality and challenging training, students will set off on a two day assessment expedition from our outdoor centre at in Rosedale (www.yorkshirebunkhouse.co.uk), walking through the beautiful Yorkshire Moors back to school. Successful completion of this assessment will allow a record number of Year 10 students to pass their Bronze Award next year. Students please meet at 0900 in the MFL area on Tuesday 30th June.

Year 12 Gold Duke of Edinburgh's Training : A group of dedicated Year 12 students will leave school on Monday 6th July, heading for the remote parts of the North Yorkshire Moors to complete a gruelling practice expedition in preparation for their final assessment expedition in September.

Year 8 Bewerley Park Outdoor Education week : Perhaps the highlight of the school calendar for our Year 8 students! This is an action packed week, which students remember for ever! Throughout the week students will get to sample a vast array of activities such as canoeing, kayaking, climbing, abseiling, gorge walking, mountain biking and not forgetting the infamous "Leap of Faith"! 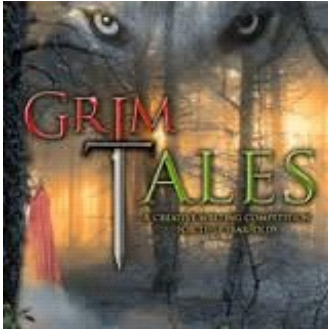

Athletics

This Monday, **Bronwen Owen** was presented with a memento by Scarborough Athletic Club, recognising her selection and participation for Great Britain at the Junior World Cross Country Championships, which were held in China earlier this year. This was after Bronwen had won the Yorkshire Country Championship for a 5th consecutive year, the Northern Championship and the Welsh Championship.

The following day, Bronwen was told that she had been selected to represent Great Britain at the European Track and Field Championships, which will be held in Sweden on 16/17 July. This will be a week after the European Junior Triathlon Championships in Geneva, and for which she has also been selected. So her final days at school, before she hopefully moves on to Leeds University will certainly be eventful!

Emma Clapton will be representing North Yorkshire Schools at the prestigious English Schools Track and Field Championships at Gateshead on 10/11 July. The championships have a strict entry standard based on performance, which Emma has achieved as the reigning Yorkshire County Champion. She has also qualified for the British Triathlon Championships at Liverpool on 26 July, and will be aiming to be selected for Great Britain as she was last year when she competed for the team in Russia.

Year 10 Geography Fieldwork Trip

On Tuesday 23rd June, 85 intrepid Year 10 geography students set off for Helmsley and Sutton Bank with a quest to find out if tourism is having a positive or negative impact on the North York Moors National Park. Having never had such a large group of geographers out at once the trip was a significant undertaking. However, despite one of the coaches missing the turning for Sutton Bank Visitor Centre and committing to the 1 in 4 gradient of Sutton Bank itself, the trip ran with military precision.

Mrs Pye and Mrs Charlton's group (who was on her last ever Lady Lumley's trip) spent the morning asking their pre-made questionnaires to passing locals and tourists in Helmsley. Students were amazed to discover the strength of social media as a lady who has followed Helmsley on Twitter decided she 'just had to visit this beautiful town' and made the 10,000 mile trip from Australia. Following completion of pedestrian surveys and car park occupancy rates, many of the students were curious to find out why there were two Thomas the Bakers in the Market Place so ventured in to ask further questions. They emerged full of facts about their different target audiences and conveniently a bag of yum yums!



Meanwhile, Mrs Fuller and Mrs Temple's group, wonderfully assisted by Mrs Jackson and Mrs Briston, journeyed on up to the visitor's centre at Sutton Bank to assess the impact of tourism on a different type of place in the National Park. Footpath erosion surveys were conducted near James Herriot's 'Finest view in England'. Here are some of the students in action.

Overall, the field trip was a success with plenty of high quality primary data collected for the students' controlled assessments which will now be presented and analysed in order to conclude their investigation.
