Lady Lumley's House System

The aims of the house system were shared with staff and students this week:

- To give students a supportive and secure environment in which they have a sense of pride and identity.
- The system will foster a close rapport between students and staff while providing positive competition.
- The House system will also help new students and staff to settle into the community of Lady Lumley's School.

The core values embodied in the House system are respect, determination, courage, equality, inspiration and cooperation. There will be a range of house activities and new competitions alongside the established sporting competitions. Students will be awarded House Points for cooperation, contribution to house events, peer coaching and upholding the core values of the house system.

The first new events were announced this week.

Students have been challenged to design a **House Logo**. It must create an instantly recognisable house badge considering the house colours and the history of the house. The best design for each house will become the new house logos. Then there is the **LLS Bake Off** – three rounds of baking culminating in a show stopper. Round 1 is individual and rounds 2 and 3 will require students (and possibly staff!) to work in teams. The winning team and therefore house will be crowned Bake Off Champions. And all this will be recorded and videos presented by the **House Media Teams**. Their role will be to video and provide media coverage of the various events throughout the year, starting with Bake Off.

As part of the new House System, there are 4 new posts being created for General House Captains. This will be one person from each year group and the posts are open to any student who has an enthusiastic approach and can work well with others. Students can apply by writing an application letter (½ to 1 side of A4) to their head of house by Friday 15th January.
