Dear Parents, Carers and Friends

We had a superb Key Stage 3 Prizegiving Evening on Wednesday of this week. Stuart Cleary led the celebration of the achievements of students in last year's Years 7, 8 and 9 and we had a packed assembly hall for the event. Our guest of honour for the evening was Susie Mackenzie, who has recently retired from her post as educational psychologist with North Yorkshire County Council. Susie knows Lady Lumley's well and spoke very highly of the school and especially the excellent behaviour and positive attitude of the students who are here. There are some more high profile events over the next few weeks. On Wednesday 28<sup>th</sup> September we have the Year 10 information evening, so if you are a Bake-Off fan and have a child in Year 10, that is two Wednesdays on the trot when you may miss the start of the programme. At least with the move to Channel 4 this is unlikely to be a problem next year. On the following Wednesday we have probably the biggest event of the year, the Year 5 and 6 Open Evening, about which I wrote last week, and the next two Wednesdays see the Year 7 and Year 12 meet the tutor evening and the Year 11 parents' consultation evening. The event I really want to bring to your attention is to be held on Friday 21<sup>st</sup> October, the Sponsored Walk. Not only is this great fun and a lovely way to end the half-term, it is also a wonderful way for the students to bond together and an opportunity for the school to raise funds to help with the education of the students. The Sponsored Walk is a biennial event (I had to look that up to check! Biennial means every two years, biannual means twice a year) and students always remember their sponsored walks long after leaving the school. This time we are making a few changes to the walk. **Word of the week - Product.** This is one of many words which has a large number of meanings and therefore its use can cause confusion. As an example, in one of the training days at the beginning of this term, we heard the great example of the use of the word *conversion*. If you were a PE teacher talking about rugby, the word conversion means something very different from an RE teacher using the same word. The danger is that the teachers know exactly what the word means in their subject, but the students go from subject to subject and may bring the wrong definition with them. That is why, as teachers, we try to make sure we find out what the students think a word means, and the students need to ask every time for clarification if they have any doubt whatsoever. Product is an annoying word in some ways as it has different meanings in different subjects and even different meanings in normal everyday language. Before even looking in a dictionary, my first thought is that product means something made in a factory, but, if I was in a hairdressers, product would mean some shampoo or conditioner. In normal conversation, we use the word product to mean the result or consequence of an action "*what did you expect the product of that to be?*". In maths, product has a very specific meaning and students need to be tuned into that meaning. The product is the result of multiplying numbers (*what is the product of 5 times 3. Answer 15*). In science, product also has a specific meaning; what is formed in a chemical reaction (*in a reaction, reactants turn into products*) and again, teachers and students need to be aware of the different meanings in different circumstances. I would hate anyone to sit in an RE lesson imagining people being kicked over a goalpost when undergoing a conversion!

### A 'Novel' idea for Charity

A member of the Lady Lumley's support staff will be helping local charity Ryedale Special Families with the sales of his latest book. Paul Holbrook, who works in the Learning Support department, has decided to donate a percentage of the profits from his new novel *Domini Mortum* to the charity, which provides support and care for children and young people with disabilities, special needs and illness.

The novel, which is a Victorian supernatural murder mystery, is currently being promoted by the publisher Unbound and once published will begin to raise funds for the charity, which provides fun days out, respite care and family support.
