One of the great things about staff at Lady Lumley's is that they are never satisfied and always want to improve even further. The mathematics teachers have already broken the taboo of setting by so-called ability and now are taking up the opportunity to work with other primary and secondary school to try evidence based ideas in future lessons. There is a really useful document called "Improving mathematics in Key Stage two and three" recently published by the Education Endowment Foundation which is available from their website if you want an early glimpse of where the maths department are going over the next few months.

Thought Of The Week



Word Of The Week - Dormant.

This word came up in a chat I was having with a Year 9 student about her geography work. Whilst the word was unfamiliar to her, there are so many words that sound like it that one would have a good chance of working out what it means. Dormitory, dormer window and dormouse immediately came to my mind. A dormitory is large room containing several beds (the word must have been used in the Harry Potter books), a dormer window is a vertical window built out from a sloping roof (see the houses diagonally opposite the Lidl in Pickering) and a dormouse is a small rodent that looks like a mouse with a furry tail. The dormouse in Alice in Wonderland (possibly my favourite book) is always falling asleep. You will have spotted by now that the link is to do with sleeping. A dormer window takes its name from being a window into a sleeping room (or bedroom) and dormouse are thought to be sleepy as they can hibernate over 6 months in a year. Another clue is the French word dormir, which means sleep. So dormant means quiet or inactive as during sleep. A dormant volcano is not extinct or erupting, but "asleep" and can wake up at any time.

Maths Challenge Answer

1. **D** Kieran makes 4 jumps in 6 seconds so makes 2 jumps in 3 seconds. Therefore it will take him $(30 \div 2) \times 3$ seconds = 45 seconds to make 30 jumps.

7. **E** The length of the edge of Charlie's original square is $(20 \div 4)$ cm = 5 cm. Since he cuts his square into two rectangles, he cuts parallel to one side of the square to create two rectangles each with two sides 5 cm long as shown in the diagram. Hence the total perimeter of his two rectangles is 2×5 cm = 10 cm longer than the perimeter of his square. Since the perimeter of one of the rectangles is 16 cm, the perimeter of the other rectangle is $(20 + 10 - 16)$ cm = 14 cm.
